## The Fall

Horowitz, Michael. "New Intolerance Between Crescent and Cross." The Wall Street Journal. 5 July 1995. The mental process which led the woman to the original sin is revealed in the next verse:

Genesis 3:6 - When the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was desirable to make one wise, she took from its fruit and ate; and she gave to her husband with her, and he ate.

The woman had no sinful nature, so she was not tempted by it. But she did have volition and she could be tempted by outside pressures which she permitted to become internal stress. Satan has very subtly weakened her volition by means of flattery. He asks her a Bible question and she is very complimented by that.

Genesis 3:1c - Has Elohim indeed said, 'You shall not eat of ANY tree of the Garden?'
