Davies, Christie. "What Made Them Moral?" National Review. 3 Apr. 1995, pp. 63-64:

Well, maybe. But it will be difficult considering the contorted souls our perverted twentieth century has produced. Listen to what establishment-oriented young people are up against when they seek to objectively and logically debate the issues.

Racho, Mark. "Letter From East Village: Generation X." Chronicles. April 1995, 43-44:

Why was the Englishman's answer wrong? Perversion demands observance of reverse taboos. According to Mark Racho, failure to adopt the correct attitudes results in becoming alienated. "Without the sociopolitical skills that today masquerade as good manners," he says, "it is quite possible to talk one's way into trouble."
